



## Message by UNWTO Secretary-General, Taleb Rifai, on the occasion of World Migratory Bird Day

The World Tourism Organization (UNWTO), the United Nations Specialized Agency for Tourism, is very proud to join this year's World Migratory Bird Day (WMBD) celebrations dedicated to highlighting the links between migratory bird conservation and wildlife watching tourism.

Every year, millions of tourists are wondered by the world's wild flora and fauna while travelling. The spectacular movements of the world's migratory birds, a true natural heritage, are no exception, and a key tourist attraction in many destinations.
